

Six-lined Long-tailed Grass Lizard *Takydromus sexlineatus* on Pulau Bintan, Riau Islands, Indonesia

Location: Garden of de Bintan Villa resort, situated south of Kampur village, Pulau Bintan, Riau Islands, Indonesia.
Habitat: Rural garden compound surrounded by disturbed, secondary forest
Date and time: 21 October 2012, 11:09 hrs.

Identity of subject: Six-lined Long-tailed Grass Lizard, Takydromus sexlineatus (Reptilia: Sauria: Lacertidae).

Description of observation: One example of estimated 6 cm snout-vent length (35 cm total length) was seen moving on the ground in short grass (Figs. 1 and 2.). Its body movement as it ran away appeared typical of a snake, which it was at first assumed to be, with a long undulating tail.

Remarks: The Six-lined Long-tailed Grass Lizard inhabits disturbed, open, grassy areas and has an immensely long tail that can be over 5 times the length of its head and body. It ranges from India and southern China, down to northern parts of Peninsula Malaysia including Kedah and Penang Island (Grismer, 2011: 542). There are no records south of there, but the species also occurs on Borneo, Sumatra, Java and Bali (Das, 2010: 225).
